MINUTES OF FEBRUARY 29, 2017 MEETING:

Classroom Technology Platform:

A discussion was led by Dan Snow (BYU Professor of Business). He was asked to come and give his advice of the different technology platforms that possibly CMS teachers could all start using. Dan presented a lot of good information. He went over several handouts concerning logic and recommendations for Learning Management Systems. (These are included in these minutes.)

Riley Hanni suggested that if CMS decides to have all teachers use Canvas-

- 1. Training should be help during contracted hours
- 2. There must be continued support on how to use Canvas

Lisa Boyce also commented that whatever platform that is chosen, a parents night to train them, would be very helpful. We should find out what the teacher's needs are when deciding what platform to use.

Halley Kartchner currently uses Google Classroom. Some of her students know a little about Canvas-but say it is a little confusing to them.

It was agreed by everyone that Gaye will form a Technology Committee to:

- -Prioritize teacher's needs
- -Talk to teachers, students, parents about concerns
- -Come up with one system for all CMS teachers to use

Gaye asked Marci LeMonnier, Lisa Boyce to be on committee-they agreed. Dan Snow was asked & will check his time schedule to see if he can, but will recommend someone else if he cannot.

Dan concluded by going over a flyer "Logic and Recommendations for Learning Management System at CMS" (also included in these minutes.) It included considering cost, having only one system for all, and having more teachers on the committee than parents.

Robbie Chaney-BYU Professor Of Public Health presented information SRTS (Safe Routes To School):

Robbie handed out flyers that gave information about their goal and plans to implement them. Their goal is to improve the safety of students walking and parents driving to school.

Suggestions were given to:

- -Contact Gary Wilson at Provo School District. He is over Student Services and has the contacts with Provo City. They may be able to help.
- -BYU Students will be surveying how traffic and students enter and leave CMS roadways to determine how things could be improved for safety.
- -BYU students should make sure they can be identified as they are doing the surveying. (Wearing bright colored vests, etc.)
- -It was suggested that the BYU students gather all their data and then present it to parents for their support.
- -Council said they suggest asking a couple of PTA parents to help with this.

Choose topics for future informative parent nights:

From the discussion of items/topics from last meeting, these two were chosen for possible parent nights for next school year:

- 1. Whichever Learning Management System is chosen, have a parents night to present it and train parentson how to use it.
- 2. Internet Safety Fair

(It was suggested to have translators in Spanish and any other language that is needed.)

Time ran out, therefore discussion on the book Mindset will be postponed until the next meeting.

Logic and Recommendations for Learning Management System (LMS) at CMS

- Costs of having multiple LMS:
 - No APPARENT extra work for teachers, but lose out on teacher collaboration benefits from all using same system (common platform)
 - Common announcement system
 - Meetings
 - Common materials
 - o MUCH extra work for students and parents (time loss)
 - Increased likelihood of things slipping through cracks with students and parents (dropped balls)
 - Miss out on possible benefits of having common platform to connect with students and parents (critical mass for learning)
- Recommendations
 - o Need one system
 - o Form committee to recommend one LMS to principal
 - Avoids appearance of favoritism/corruption
 - Committee formed of 5, including teachers, staff, parents(?)
 - · Ask stakeholder views on systems they have used
 - Interviews teachers for what features they like
 - (doesn't ask them to vote for the their favorite LMS)
 - o Committee recommends and Principal adopts one new system. Adopt over the summer for Fall 2017 implementation.

Why is the University transitioning to Canvas?

How was the decision to move to a new learning management system (LMS) made?

The decision to transition to Canvas as Northwestern's new educational platform was based on an 18 month LMS Initiative involving faculty, students, and staff from across the University. This evaluation was completed under the direction of the LMS Review Group, chaired by Greg Light, Director of Searle Center for Advancing Learning & Teaching, with the approval of the IT Governance Educational Technologies Advisory Committee, chaired by Ron Braeutigam, Associate Provost, Office of the Provost. What are the benefits of Canvas?

Canvas has an intuitive interface that supports a deep focus on teaching and learning. Its robust features help to enhance teaching and learning beyond the physical classroom. Canvas is:

- intuitive it has a clean interface for desktops, laptops, tablets, and smart phones
- flexible allows customization to support a range of pedagogical styles and formats
- · dynamic and cloud-based with continual improvements to features
- engaging instructors can easily connect with students through rich video, audio, text chatting, and discussion board options
- reliable excellent track record, with 24/7/365 support
- · efficient -faster and easier grading with SpeedGrader

What other universities are switching Canvas?

Other adopters of Canvas include the University of California, Berkeley, Brown University, University of Pennsylvania, and the University of Washington system.

What does the transition to Canvas involve?

What is involved in the transition to Canvas?

Transitioning to Canvas is an opportunity for instructors to review, rethink, and redesign their courses using a next generation educational platform that supports pedagogical and technological innovation.

Everyone currently using the University's Blackboard Course Management System will need to move any content they wish to use in the future off of Blackboard by August 2015.

Blackboard will not be available for active courses after spring quarter, 2015. Academic and academic-related courses can also be moved into Canvas. NUIT will evaluate requests to move non-academic custom sites for faculty, student, and staff collaboration on a case-by-case basis. Instructors not currently using Blackboard may opt to start using Canvas at any time.

<u>Training</u> is available to assist instructors, TAs, and staff with migrating and redesigning their course and community sites.

Ongoing support is available to all Canvas users for assistance with general inquiries and troubleshooting.

How long is the transition?

The Canvas Transition started in fall 2014 and will officially end on August 31, 2015, when the Blackboard Course Management System will be retired. No new course sites will be provisioned in Blackboard for summer 2015.

Who is coordinating the transition?

To coordinate the Canvas Transition, NUIT is working with the <u>Canvas Transition Committee</u> (CTC) and the <u>Canvas Distributed University Instructional Technology Support (CANDUITS)</u> network. These two groups are comprised of representatives from schools and units from across the University.

The Canvas Transition Committee is a group comprised of faculty and staff representatives from across the University that is guiding specific investigations of Northwestern's archiving, anti-plagiarism, branding, and other Canvas Transition related needs.

CANDUITS is a new and ongoing group focused on coordinating educational technology and instructional design support at Northwestern. Its primary objective for the upcoming year is to facilitate the University's transition to Canvas.

When do I transition?

Do I have a choice?

The Blackboard Course Management System will be retired on August 31, 2015, with no active course sites available during the 2015 summer quarter.

Anyone who is currently using the Blackboard Course Management System and wishes to continue using a University-supported learning management system to host their course site will need to move to Canvas prior to summer 2015. After spring quarter 2015, active courses sites will only be available in Canvas.

When are Blackboard courses available in Canvas?

All individual academic course sites set up in SES/Caesar that are available to instructors in Blackboard are also be available in Canvas. Additionally, courses cross-listed in SES/Caesar are available in Canvas.

By April 2015, transition support will be extended to non-SES academic and academic-related courses (for example, classes in Feinberg that do not currently appear in Blackboard).

For spring 2015, in addition to all SES and non-SES academic courses, transition support will be extended to approved community-based custom course sites (for example, student groups, University centers, etc.). NUIT will evaluate requests for custom courses on a case by case basis.

Through summer 2015, instructors and staff can request sandbox course sites in Canvas to save material from Blackboard or develop content for courses in an upcoming quarter. Instructors and staff can easily copy content from their prep site into an official course site once it is active in Canvas.

When do instructors move to Canvas?

All instructors are strongly encouraged to transition to Canvas by the start of spring 2015.

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NUIT has been coordinating with each school to provide training based on their individual plan, but instructors also have a variety of <u>training opportunities</u>, <u>self-directed training options</u>, and <u>24/7 Canvas</u> support available.

Where do students find their courses during the transition?

During the Canvas Transition, Registrar courses will be available in both Blackboard and Canvas. Depending on the school and instructor, a course may be taught using Canvas or Blackboard. Instructors may also choose not to use a University-supported learning management system. Students should contact the course instructor to confirm how the course will be taught.

How do I transition my courses into Canvas?

How do I get help moving my course content into Canvas?

Throughout the transition, instructors and course support staff will have many opportunities to get help moving their course content. Scheduling for school-based workshops will be provided according to each school's transition plan. Additionally, NUIT offers ongoing training options through the <u>Canvas Learning Center</u>.

How do I move my course content into Canvas?

Recommendations on how to <u>move course content from Blackboard to Canvas</u> are available in the Canvas Learning Center.

How do I learn Canvas?

How do I get help learning to use Canvas?

The <u>Canvas Learning Center</u> includes training and transition resources for instructors, TAs, and staff who need to learn Canvas. General information is also available for <u>instructors</u>.

In the surveys of pilot participants, faculty reported learning Canvas (for developing and using a course site) in two hours and students reported learning Canvas (for using a course site) in thirty minutes.

How long does it take to learn Canvas?

In previous surveys, faculty reported learning Canvas (for developing and using a course site) in two hours and students reported learning Canvas (for using a course site) in 30 minutes

What training sessions are currently scheduled?

What types of traning are available during the transtion year?

During the transition year, NUIT will offer a variety of <u>variety of training opportunities</u>:

- In person group trainings organized by school
- In person group trainings

- In person and virtual consultations
- Computer lab drop in hours
- An Instructor Overview online training course

A 24/7/365 <u>Canvas Support service</u> is available for students, faculty, and staff needing help with Canvas. Contact Canvas Support by phone, email, or chat. All Canvas-related requests can be directed to Canvas Support. Canvas Support will route issues to NUIT as needed or by request.

Northwestern's IT Support Center will continue to provide primary support for NetID-related issues that may affect issues logging into Canvas. Contact the <u>IT Support Center</u> by phone, email, or chat.






Safe Routes to School






What we plan to do:
